Early History

From Tennal's History of Nemaha County

POSTMASTERS

Among the early day postmasters were David Magill, of Capioma; David Locknane, at Granada; Isaac H. Steer, at Richmond; John H. Smith at Seneca; A. W. Williams, at Sabetha; George Graham, at Albany; George L. Squire, at Centralia and H. H. Lanham, at Central City — the first postmaster in Nemaha county to hold his commission from Franklin Pearce. A mail route had been established, during these incumbents' service, from St. Joseph to Marysville, Sabetha and Albany, being the first points in the east of the county to get direct service. Seneca receiving its mail from Central City. When Centralia was established it received mail from Seneca. Granada at this time was known as Pleasant Springs.

EARLY TOWNS

Of the twelve original Nemaha county towns but four remain. The others seem to have been completely effaced, a absorbed into farms and even post offices long since abolished, a result of rural free mail delivery. Central City, Richmond, America City, Granada, Ash Point, Pacific City, Urbana, Wheatland, Centralia, Lincoln, Seneca and Sabetha were the original towns. Albany was the forebear of Sabetha, and was moved bodily to the Sabetha site two miles down the hill when the first railroad was run through the county. Seneca has remained on her original site. Centralia, however, was moved a mile from her original location. The Central Branch railroad refused to take the mile extra to reach the settlement of Centralia, so the villine, like Mohamet, went to the railroad. America City has always lived on the 380 acres where it had its birth, and has not since extended such acreage very much.

CENTRAL CITY

Central City, the first town, was never incorporated by legislative act. It was laid out in 1855, by William Dodge, and the first postoffice of the county established here. It lay in the neighborhood of what is now St. Benedict. H. H. Lanham was the first postmaster. A wagon and blackmisth shop, a saw and grist mill and a store were erected upon the site. Most of these business were run by the Lanham and Newton families, who had come up the Missouri river from St. Louis on the old steamboat, "Banner State," that year. The store, however was run by Benjamin Shaffer for a while, later passing into the hands of Lanham & Newton.

1883 Post Office

The cabinet of post office boxes from the St. Benedict post office was restored and donated to the Nemaha County Historical Society by Amelia Sudbeck. This cabinet had been located in Bergman's Store in St. Benedict. The cabinet is part of the 'country store' display housed in the jail area of the museum.

Cpl. McGehee Has Operation, Is Recovering

(from the Courier Tribune, Oct. 30, 1950

Mrs. Mattie Septer received word last week that her son, Cpl. Billy McGehee had undergone surgery at Fitzimmons hospital in Denver and a bullet, which was close to his heart, had been removed. Cpl. McGehee had been injured while serving with the U.S. Army in Korea, and was flown to Denver for the operation. He stood the operation well and is making a nice recovery. He is able to be up part of the time and can have visitors. Cpl. McGehee hopes to be able to spend Christmas at Seneca. His address is Room 7, 3rd Floor, Fitzimmons hospital, Denver, Colo.

St. Benedict Store

MOTOR TRUCK FOR COUNTRY STOREKEEPER

(from the 14 Sept. 1911 issue of the Seneca Tribune)

The first man in the community to make use of a motor truck for business purposes is Clemens Blocker, the St. Benedict merchant. Friday morning his machine came, a large red motor truck, similar to these used in the large cities. Mr. Blocker will use it in freighting his goods from the Seneca station to his St. Benedict store, a task that has hitherto been done by teams. It will mean a great saving of time and is a machine that can be utilized in a great many ways.

CLEMENS BLOCKER AND THE ST. BENEDICT STORE

(from the 16 April 1925 issue of the Semi Weekly Courier Tribune)

Merchant who Passed Away Last Wednesday Owned the Townsite Farm

When death came to Clemens Blocker at his home in St. Benedict at 3:30 Wednesday morning, April 8th, it removed one of the founders of that town. True there was a settlement at St. Benedict but it was known as Wildcat. When the post office department gave the little hamlet mail service it was Mr. Blocker who became the first postmaster and who gave the town its name, St. Benedict.

Clemens Blocker was born in Oldenburg, Germany, January 14, 1852, the thirteenth of fourteen children. He survived all the others. Clemens Blocker came to America in 1870 and began working for a brother in a general store in Seneca.

Then he went to Dubuque county, Iowa where he worked a year as a farm hand. But the young man wanted to better his condition. He prepared himself for teaching school and followed that profession in Iowa for seven years. It was in Dubuque county (Iowa) that he married Anna Hoefler Sept. 19, 1882. The following year he came back to Nemaha county and for a year taught in Dist. 74. He afterward established a small store in St. Benedict, which he conducted until 1897, when he sold his stock and returned to farming. In 1893 he had purchased 60 acres of land and two years later added a forty. He owned at one time the St. Benedict townsite and built a number of the dwellings.



Letters from Korea

(from the Courier Tribune, 26 Oct 1950)

Mrs. Margaret Becker, Topeka, received a letter last week from her son, Sgt. Joseph Becker, who is stationed in Korea. Sgt. Becker wrote that he expected to be with the first division to cross the 38th parallel; that he was fine but awfully busy and expected to be in Korea for some time.

(from the Courier Tribune, 7 Dec 1950)

Mr. and Mrs. Henry Enneking have received a letter from their son, Cpl. Robert H. Enneking, stating that he is now stationed in Korea.

Corporal Raymond Feldkamp, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Feldkamp arrived in Korea last week.

(from the Courier Tribune 11 Dec 1950)

Jim McNally, 21 year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. W. J. McNally, formerly of south of Centralia is a member of the 32nd Infantry Regiment of the 7th Division, which has been trapped in northeast Korea. American forces have been reported joining to work their way out of the red pincers.

(from the Courier Tribune 28 Dec 1950)

Sgt. Robert Wichman was in Northeast Korea

News of the successful withdrawal of U.S. troops from northeast Korea is especially good news to Ben Wichman family, Seneca. Sgt. Bob Wichman is with the 2nd Division, one of the units that was battling in the area.
